



## **FRUIT TREES 2026**

### **APPLES**

- \***Cortland**—Dark red skin, medium sized apple. Crisp pure white flesh resists browning when cut. Good all-purpose apple.
- \***Empire**- Crisp, sweet-tart fruit that is a cross between the McIntosh and Red Delicious varieties. Excellent for fresh eating, cooking, and have a good storage life.
- \***Freedom**- Disease-resistant apple cultivar known for its tart, crisp red fruit, excellent for fresh eating, cooking, and cider, offering resistance to scab, mildew, and fire blight.
- \***Frostbite**—Medium sized apple, sweet, sugarcane-like taste, reddish-gold skin, used in desserts, in cider or for drying.
- \***Fuji**- Sweet, crisp and juicy, ripens in October and keeps well. Vigorous production.
- \***Ginger Gold**—Golden yellow fruit with a tangy sweet flavor. One of earliest to ripen. Delicious for fresh eating. (12'-15' x 12'-15') Zone 5
- \***Granny Smith**- Tart and Tangy. Excellent for cooking.
- \***Honey Crisp**— Yellow turning red when exposed to sun. One of the most desired, sweet, juicy and crisp fruit. Ripens late September. Pollinate with Granny Smith, Fuji, or crabapple. Semi-Dwarf (12-15'), Zone 3b
- \***Macoun**— A New England favorite. High quality, dark red, firm fruit. Considered by many the best overall apple for fresh eating.
- \***McIntosh**— A classic cold climate apple, discovered in Canada in 1811. Red color, superb tart flavor. Semi-dwarf (12-15'). Zone 4.
- \***Red Delicious**- Very juicy with sweet flesh. Ripens mid-season, vigorous grower. Resistant to fire blight and cedar apple rust.
- \***Royal Gala**- Deep red apple with crisp and sweet flesh. Great for eating or cooking.
- \***Winesap**- Heirloom. Sweet with a tangy finish. Late season. Favored for cider making.
- \***Malus 4-way**— Assorted varieties grafted onto one root stock. Please see an employee for more info.
- \***Malus 6-way Espalier**- Assorted varieties grafted onto one rootstock and espaliered.

### **PEACH**

- \***Canadian Harmony**- Ripens in early to midseason. Strong producing of large fruit. Excellent shelf life. Juicy and delicious. (10'-12' x 10'-12') Zone 4
- \***Contender**- Great tasting, superior hardiness. Ripens in July. Red blushed yellow fruit. Eat fresh or preserved. (10'-12' x 10'-12') Zone 4
- \***Glo Haven**- Red skinned, yellow flesh. Heavy producer, good for fresh eating, jams, canning, and pies. Zone 5. (12'-15' x 12'-15')
- \***Glowingstar**- Red fruit, yellow flesh. Early producer, good for fresh eating, jams, canning, and pies. Zone 5. (10'-15' x 10'-15')
- \***Madison**- Cold hardy, heavy producer, juicy. Great for eating fresh, canning and baking. Zone 4. (12'-15' x 12'-15')
- \***Redhaven**— Firm skin with almost no fuzz. Excellent fruit texture. Blooms late to avoid spring frosts. Self-pollinating. Semi-dwarf (12-15'), Zone 5.
- \***Reliance**— Hardest of all peaches. Great for eating fresh. Zone 4. (10'-12' x 10'-12')

## PEAR

### European:

- \***Bartlett**– Vigorous, productive tree that bears fruit at a young age. Fruit is large, golden yellow and highly flavored. Ripens late August. Pollinate with D'Anjou or Summercrisp. Semi-Dwarf. Zone 5 (12-15')
- \***Luscious**– Heavy producer. Medium fruit matures in September. Great fresh, for canning or preserves. Pollinate with Bosc, Bartlett or D'Anjou. Semi Dwarf. Zone 4 (15'-18')
- \***Moonglow**– Large, blushed, Bartlett style pears. Soft juicy fruit. Ripens in August. Resistant to fire blight. Best pollinated with Bartlett. Semi-dwarf. Zone 5 (12-15')
- \***D'Anjou**- The bright green and egg-shaped. A truly all-purpose pear, with a juicy, tart flavor, great for baking, poaching, grilling, or roasting. Pair with Bartlett or Bosc. Semi-dwarf. Zone 5. (12'-15' x 12'-15')
- \***4-way** - Assorted varieties grafted onto one root stock. Please see an employee for more info.

### Asian:

- \***Hosui** - Exceptionally sweet, juicy, crisp, fine-grained flesh with a honey-like flavor, golden-brown russeted skin, and apple-like shape. Zone 5 (10'-15' x 10'-15')
- Juicy Jewel**- Crisp, sweet flavor. Disease resistant. Early harvest, long storage. Zone 4.
- Kikusui**– Juicy, sweet, yellow-skinned fruit - crisp like an apple when ripe. Superb fresh eating, one of the best. Zone 5.
- Reddy Robin**- Red/Orange skin, looks like an apple. Crisp fruit in late summer. Zone 5.
- Shinseiki**– Moonlight yellow. Desert cultivar. Heavy bearing and beautiful. Ripens August/September. Self-fertile, but best fruit set with cross pollination. Semi-Dwarf (8'-10'). Zone 4.
- Tawara**- Yellow, upright oval form. Crispy texture is great for eating fresh or canning. Self-fertile.
- \***Twentieth Century** - Crisp, juicy texture and sweet, slightly tart flavor with notes of vanilla and butterscotch. Zone 5.
- \***4-way** - Assorted varieties grafted onto one root stock. Please see an employee for more info.

## CHERRIES

### Sweet:

- \***Bing**– America's favorite cherry! Large, meaty, heart shaped fruit is very sweet. Needs pollination from Stella, Lapin or Black Tartan. Semi-Dwarf, (15') Zone 5.
- Black Pearl**– Large Firm fruit. Sweet dark cherry flavor. Zone 4 pollinator required.
- \***Black York**- Very productive. Sweet. Great for fresh eating. Mid-season harvest. Stella is a good pollinator. Zone 5.
- \***Lapins**– Large, sweet, deep red fruit. Superior flavor to Bing. High crack resistance. Self-pollinating. Semi-dwarf (12-15'). Zone 5.
- \***Regina**- A late-blooming and late-harvesting sweet cherry variety known for its large, firm, and highly crack-resistant fruit. Zone 4 (7'-9' x 8'-10')
- \***Stella**– Large, dark red fruit. Sweet, rich flavor. Moderate crack resistance. Self-pollinating. Semi-dwarf (15'). Zone 5.
- \***Sweetheart**- A large, bright red, sweet, self-fertile cherry with excellent flavor. This late-ripening beauty will extend the cherry season when paired with other varieties. Zone 5.
- \***White Gold**- Heavy cropping and self-fertile. Red-yellow fruits are sweet. Zone 5.
- \***4-way Cherry**– Assorted varieties grafted onto one root stock. Please see an employee for more info.

### Sour:

- \***Crimson Passion**- High quality firm fruit. Self-fertile. Shrub form cherry. Harvest in August of dark red fruits. Zone 2.
- \***Cutie Pie** – Bright red, sweet-tart fruit perfect for pies and fresh eating, thriving in small spaces, containers, and cold climates zones 2-7 (4'-5'H x 4'-8' W)
- \***Juliet** - Dwarf sour cherry tree, known for being cold-hardy, self-fertile, and producing large, sweet-tart, deep-red fruit. Can be eaten fresh, or used in pies, jams, and other preserves. Zone 2 (5'-7' x 5'-7')
- Cupid** - Early bloomer producing oversized fruit. Shrub form. Dark Red. Self-pollinating. Zone 2.
- Meteor** – Prolific producer. Large bright red fruit. Great in BBQ sauces. Dwarf form. Self-fertile. Zone 4.
- \***Montmorency**- Heavy producer. Vigorous spring flowers. Pies, preserves, jams, and baked goods. Self-fertile.
- \***North Star**– Light red skin with red flesh. Produces heavy crops and is disease resistant. Very hardy. Good for pies and preserves. Ripens mid-June. Self-pollinating. Dwarf (6-9'), Zone 4.
- Sweet Cherry Pie**- Compact size, sweet fruit is great for baking, and preserves. Great for home gardens and small orchards.

## JAPANESE PLUM

**Burbank-** Bountiful harvest. Attracts pollinators and birds. Red – purple fruit. Great fresh, canned or preserved. Zone 5. Cross with Santa Rosa, Satsuma, Methley or another Japanese Plum.

**\*Elephant Heart** -Large, heart-shaped, deep reddish-purple skin, vibrant red flesh, and exceptionally sweet, juicy, slightly tangy flavor, making it excellent for fresh eating, preserves, and baking, ripening late in the summer. Zone 5 (12'-15' x 12'-15')

**Methley-** Produces medium to large, round to conical clingstone fruit with purple-red skin; the juicy red flesh has a sweet, mild flavor. Ideal for fresh eating and jelly. Late May-Early June. Zone 5. Partially Self-fertile. Cross with another Jap. Plum.

**\*Santa Rosa-** Round fruit, purple-red skin, sweet-tart flavor, can or eat fresh. Zone 5. (18'-20' x 18'-20')

**Satsuma-** Dark red fruit July-August. Firm, juicy, sweet flesh. Pollinates with Burbank. Zone 5.

## EUROPEAN PLUM

**\*Green Gage-** Small green plums with excellent flavor. Exceptional for eating fresh. Partially self-fertile, but best paired with another European Plum/prune variety. Zone 5 (14'-20' x 14'-20')

## PRUNE

**\*Italian** – Heavy producer. Perfect for drying. Mid-season harvest. Partially self-fertile. Cross with European plum varieties. Zone 5.

**Stanley**– Purple skin with yellow flesh. Perfect for eating right off the tree! Ripens in September. Cross with other European Plum varieties. Semi-dwarf (15-18'), Zone 5.

## APRICOT

**Goldbar-** Large flavorful fruit. Easy to grow. Pollinator magnet. Zone 5. Self-fertile, but best crossed with another apricot variety. Zone 5.

**Goldcot-** Fruit is freestone with golden yellow skin and flesh and has a deep tangy flavor that is perfect for fresh eating or canning. Partially self-fertile. Zone 5.

**Goldstrike-** Large and firm, orange flesh. Moderate juiciness and sweetness. Zone 5.

**Perfection-** Fruits borne by this productive, hardy tree is very large, sweet, and juicy. More cold hardy than typical of apricots, it is a good performer and producer. Partially self-fertile. Zone 4.

## NECTARINE

**\*ArcticGlo-** Red skinned, white fleshed. Balance of sugar and acid makes for excellent flavor. Great fresh or used for cooking or preserving. Zone 5.

**\*Firebright-** A large, yellow nectarine partially covered with a red blush. The flesh is also yellow, firm, and has excellent flavor. The tree is vigorous and productive.

**Flavortop-** Dependable and productive. Sweet and juicy fruit that is great to eat fresh or in baking and preserves. Zone 5.

**\*Hardired-** Medium fruits are firm sweet and delicious. Eat fresh or in baking/preserves. Easy to grow and hardy. Zone 5.

**\*Independence-** Yellow fleshed fruit is golden skinned that is tinged in red. Tasty and sweet.

**Red Gold-** Large fruit with deep red skin. Sweet, juicy yellow flesh. Great for fresh eating or in preserves or other desserts. Ripens mid-August. Zone 5.

## SMALL FRUITS

### BLUEBERRY

**\*Bushel and Berry ‘Jelly Bean’**— Mid-season. Bright green foliage with hints of red. This variety is great for a patio container and also makes a great hedgerow! Large berries. Compact growth, 2-3’x2-3’, Zone 4.

**Bushel and Berry ‘Midnight Cascade’**— Mid-season fruit on cascading branches. Aromatic flavor, high in antioxidants. Dark green to red foliage. 1.5-2’ x 1.5-2’ cascading, Zone 5.

**\*Bushel and Berry ‘Perpetua’**— Mid Season and Fall. A true double cropping blueberry that produces small, sweet and mild fruit. Grows to 4’ x 4’, Zone 4.

**\*Bushel and Berry ‘Peach Sorbet’**— Mid-season. Foliage changes from peach to pink to dark purple in fall. Perfect for a container! Large berries. Compact growth, 2-3’x2-3’, Zone 4.

**\*Bushel and Berry ‘Pink Icing’**— Mid-season. Beautiful pink spring foliage. Large sweet berries. 3’-4’ x 3’-4’, Zone 5.

**Bushel and Berry ‘Silver Dollar’**— Large, sweet, pineapple tasting fruit with eucalyptus like foliage. Fruit ripening in July and October. 2-3’ x 2-3’, Zone 5.

**\*Bluecrop**— Large berries. Great taste. Easy care. Ripens mid-July (mid). Grows 6’x 6’. Zone 4

**\*Bluegold**- Mid-season, cold-hardy variety with high production and superior fruit quality. 4’-6’ x 4’-6’. Zone 4.

**\*Blue Jay**— Easy to grow, tolerates part shade and dry acidic soils. Ripens Aug (mid). Purple-red fall foliage. Great wildlife attractant for bees and birds. Grows 5-7’x 5-7’. Zone 4.

**\*Blue Ray**— Large berries. Great flavor. Produces heavy yields. Ripens mid-July (mid). Grows 4-5’H x 4-5’ W. Zone 4.

**\*Chandler**— World’s largest berries. Nice flavor. Produces heavy yields. Ripens mid-late. Grows 5’-6’H x 5’-6’ W. Zone 5.

**\*Duke**- Medium to large fruit. Flowers late and fruits early. Excellent flavor. Grows 5’-7’ x 5’-7’. Zone 4.

**\*Jersey**- Large, burly and productive. Small to medium-sized, sweet dark blue fruit. Consistent late-season producer. Grows 6’-7’ x 6’-7’. Zone 4.

**Northblue**- Sweet and tart, juicy, dark blue berries. Half-high bush. 2’-3’ x 2’-3’. Mid-summer fruit. Zone 3.

**\*Northland**- Half high variety with sweet dark fruit that ripens in June. Grows 3’-4’ tall x 4’-5’ wide. Zone 3.

**\*Patriot**—Early season fruit. Beautiful fall color. Massive yields. Grows 4’ x 4’ W. Zone 3.

**\*Polaris**- Half-high bush with medium sized, powder blue, aromatic, extremely sweet tasting fruit in late July and early August. 3’-4’ x 3’-4’. Zone 3.

### GRAPE

**Himrod**— Highly productive vine, bearing crispy, sweet, seedless, golden fruit. Zone 5.

**\*Canadice**— Seedless red grape. Compact clusters of large sweet fruit. Zone 5.

**\*Cayuga White**— Heavy producer for northern climates. Can be eaten fresh but is great in white wines. Zone 4.

**\*Concord**- Heavy producer of dark blueish black fruit. Great fruit for jellies and wine. Zone 4.

**\*Edelweiss**- Sweet and delicious, green table grape, jellies or wine. Zone 4.

**\*Frontenac**- Deep purple fruit for juicing or in wines. Zone 4.

**Itasca**- Golden fruit with low acidity. Good white wine variety. Resistant to mildew. Zone 4.

**\*Lakemont**- Delicious grapes for fresh eating or wine. Crisp, juicy, sweet, yellowish green fruit. High in acid. Vigorous, heavily productive vines. Zone 5.

**\*Reliance**— Seedless red grape. Medium sized fruit ripens September. Great for eating fresh, juice and jellies. Zone 4.

***Note: Grapes grow as high as they are trained, meaning as high as the support that they are growing on.***

## BLACKBERRY

**\*Bushel & Berry Baby Cakes**— Large, sweet berries on a thornless plant. Produces two crops, in mid-summer & fall. 3-4', Zone 4.

**Black Satin**— Large sweet berries that ripen in late July or early August. Thorn-less. 6-8', Zone 4.

**\*Triple Crown** – Heavy producing blackberry. Easy to grow. Fruit is huge and tasty. Zone 5.

## RASPBERRY

**\*Anne**—Fall-bearing, Yellow Raspberry. Large, firm, sweet berry. 5'-7' x 5'-7'. Zone 4.

**\*Bristol Black**— Very large and very sweet. Ripens in July. Great for eating fresh and baking. 6-8', Zone 4.

**\*Bushel and Berry Raspberry Shortcake**— Bright red fruit on a compact plant. Good for containers. 3-5', Zone 3.

**\*Caroline**—Most productive fall bearing raspberry! Large and flavorful fruit. Great fresh or for pies, and pastries.

Extremely hardy. 6-8', Zone 4.

**\*Chester**—

**\*Fall Gold**— Sweet golden yellow berries ripening midsummer. Vigorous and highly productive. Zone 4.

**\*Heritage**—Ever-bearing. Medium, firm fruit sweet with mild flavor. Ripens in July and again in September. Cut out fruiting canes after spring crop. 6-8', Zone 2.

**Jacklyn**— Ever-bearing, super sweet red fruit. Fruit ripens twice a year. Zone 4.

**\*Jewel**— Large, very flavorful black raspberry. Ripens early. 6-8', Zone 4.

**Joan J**— Self fruitful, thornless red raspberry. Heavy bearing and easy to pick. Zone 4.

**Kokanee**— Late season, bright red and glossy fruit that is medium-large. Firm and fantastic flavor. Zone 3.

**Meeker**— Large conical dark berry that is excellent for processing and eating fresh. Early fall harvest. Zone 4.

**\*Polana**— Medium, firm fruit with sweet flavor. Ever-bearing, ripens in July and again in August. Easy to grow! 6-8', Zone 3.

**Vintage**— Dark red, extra-large fruit. Sugary sweet flavor and long season producer. Zone 4.

## STRAWBERRIES

### Everbearing & June-bearing

Plant in spot with full sun for most of the day. Prepare soil with organic matter (compost), and approximately 1 lb. of 5-10-5 fertilizer per 100sq'. Space plants 8-12" apart. Remove runners as they appear to increase the plants yield. If strawberries are to be used as a perennial crop, remove the flower stalks the first year to improve second year growth. Mulching with hay can help keep weeds down between plants and can also be used for winter protection in a 3-4" layer.
